




CHAIR'S OBSERVATIONS BY PETER MILES

Those of you who read the AGM booklet, posted out with the Autumn edition of 'Artefacts', might have noticed that at last year's AGM it was voted to reduce the number of Members required in order for our future AGMs to be quorate. This seemed prudent given our smaller membership and the impact of the Covid pandemic.

owever, over 50 Members attended our 2023 AGM in September and we were delighted that it was so well supported. Thank you.

I believe that one of the reasons that we had such a good turnout this year was because our Members are concerned about Birmingham's galleries and museums, particularly following Birmingham City Council issuing the Section 114 notice on 5 September, a week before the AGM, and the speculative and financially troubling news reports. We were fortunate in that we had Toby Watley to explain what was happening from his perspective as Birmingham Museums Trust (BMT)'s Director of Collections and, after the formal meeting, we had Zac Mensah (BMT's joint CEO) to explain BMT's vision for the reopening of Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery (BMAG).

BMAG itself, BMT's flagship site, has had a double blow with its closure during Covid and then its closure for essential maintenance work on the fabric of the building.

The Council House itself is complete – work has been finished and it looks good. In BMAG, the Round Room and the Industrial Gallery were opened briefly in 2022 – a 'pop up' reopening for the Commonwealth Games – but it was closed again whilst ongoing essential maintenance was carried out. Whilst this work itself is now nearly complete, the galleries will need a lot of work in order for them to be prepared

to display Birmingham's collections and to be reopened.

I was fortunate in having a guided tour by Toby and Zac of both the galleries and behind the scenes in September. There is a lot of work still to be done. And this will, of course, require money.

And of course, we know the situation. Birmingham Museums Trust are working very hard to secure funding towards the redisplay and reopening of BMAG. Following on from the Section 114 notice, we can but hope that the government commissioners look favourably on these requests.

To lighten the mood – I certainly don't look good in protective clothing!



At our October Committee Meeting, Toby Watley asked the Friends to

contribute £30,000 towards supporting the redisplay and reopening of BMAG's galleries. He explained that this money would demonstrate the Friends' support and would enable BMT to apply for and hopefully to secure additional funding. We were, of course, delighted to support this vital work to enable BMAG to reopen as soon as possible. So watch this space!

As a personal recommendation, I wanted to highlight an exhibition of the portraits of Frans Hals, which has just opened in London at the National Gallery.

Painted four hundred years ago, Hals' portraits continue to breathe with life. He captures the hint of a smile, a glint in his sitter's eye, a hand resting nonchalantly on a hip, and sometimes even a burst of laughter.

Around 50 of Hals' works have been brought together in an exhibition celebrating one of the most sought-after painters of his generation. Hals was a gifted artist with a remarkable reputation and his deft brushwork was unparalleled. He developed a new style of portrait, highly unusual in his time, which showed relaxed, lively sitters, often smiling, and occasionally laughing.

And who cannot be enthralled with what must be one of his most favourite portraits! \blacksquare

What is it? How is it made? And how did cameo glass bring fame and fortune to the streets of The Crystal Mile?

In the late 19th century, the screw market was dominated by the Nettlefold and Chamberlain families, the self-styled 'Screw Kings'! In 1900, the merged company Guest, Keen & Nettlefold (GKN) was born, and went on to become one of the world's largest engineering conglomerates. Winterbourne House in Edgbaston, built by John Sutton Nettlefold, has always celebrated its historical connection to GKN, and now has a significant GKN archive and exhibition. This talk will explore the history of the company and its connection to Winterbourne, and the process of creating the exhibition. After the talk, you

can see objects from the archive up close, and enjoy a guided visit to the exhibition.



TOUR OF SELLY MANOR MUSEUM AND BOURNVILLE VILLAGE

By public transport: 15 minutes from Bournville Station, and on the 11 and 27 bus routes.

Selly Manor Museum, made up of two distinct and beautiful buildings, lies at the heart of Bournville garden village in Birmingham and has a surprising history. Selly Manor dates from medieval times and its intriguing past includes an Italian wine merchant, a burglar and a world-famous chocolate maker! Originally called 'Smyths Tenement', it was a prosperous house until 1695 when it had a new owner and its slow decline began. By the end of the 19th century, it was divided into three dwellings known as 'The Rookery' and then it fell into disuse. With an uncertain future, George Cadbury, founder of Bournville, saved the building and arranged its move from nearby Selly Oak into his new village where it stands today.

Minworth Greaves, a magnificent cruck-framed hall, is about 750 years old. It was moved from near Sutton Coldfield in Birmingham and re-built on site in Bournville in 1932 by George Cadbury's son Laurence.



WALKING TOUR AROUND THE MOOR POOL ESTATE

Date: Friday 21 June 2024, 1.15 pm for a 1.30pm start Cost: £10 members, £14 non-members (includes refreshments) Meeting Point: Moor Pool Hall on The Circle on the Moor Pool Estate, B17 9DY

By car: There are no parking restrictions on the roads around Moor Pool. By bus: The Number 11 bus comes along the Lordswood Road and drops off at the top of Carless Avenue, which is a 10 minute walk from The Circle. The 23 and 24 buses drop off in Harborne High Street, which is approximately 15 minutes to Moor Pool. From the High Street, turn onto Station Road and then Wentworth Road. Turn right onto Wentworth Gate, which will bring you onto The Circle. Step back in time with a walking tour around the Moor Pool Estate in Harborne. Built at the beginning of the twentieth century, this hidden Birmingham gem was the brainchild of John Sutton Nettlefold, town-planning pioneer and wealthy industrialist. This Garden Suburb has survived virtually intact for over one hundred years, and is the perfect combination of heritage, nature and community. Visitors will take a gentle stroll around the Estate, which is virtually unchanged since its completion in 1912. At the end of the tour visitors have the opportunity to have a game of skittles in the original Edwardian bowling alley! This is a predominantly outdoor excursion and Moor Pool is an undulating area. Please wear suitable footwear and clothing to suit the weather conditions and advise us of any additional needs you may have.

FRIENDS SUBSCRIPTION RATE INCREASE

You will have seen in your AGM booklet, which accompanied the Autumn 2023 edition of 'Artefacts', that one of the items for discussion at this year's AGM was an increase to our subscription rates. Our membership subscription rates have remained unchanged for the last 9 years, since the last increase on 1 October 2014.

At the AGM, our Deputy Chair acknowledged that it was a difficult time to raise costs, particularly in light of BMAG's continued closure. However, the Committee need to ensure that the Friends' membership subscriptions cover the rising administrative costs and the proposed increase would cover the significant rise in postage rates over the last 9 years. The Committee's recommendation was that the increase to annual subscriptions rates be delayed until 1 June 2024.

The proposed new rates are based on the current rates being raised by the same percentage across all the membership

categories. These were discussed at the AGM and Members felt that this increase was fair. However, it was suggested that the double concessionary membership rate should rise by slightly more (from £32 to £40, rather than £35 as had been proposed in the AGM booklet) in order for it to remain a fair comparison to a concessionary single rate. This proposal was voted on by all Members present who voted in favour of the subscription rates being increased.

Therefore, from 1 June 2024, our new annual subscription rates will be as follows:

Single

£35 (currently £32)

Single Concession (retired) £23 (currently £21)

Single Student

£16 (currently £15)

Double (including children under 16) £52 (currently £48)

Double Concession (retired) £40 (currently £32)

These revised rates will continue to be collected from our Members in the same way as they currently are. If you have a direct debit with us, these will be automatically increased, and you do not need to do anything. If you currently pay by cash, cheque or bank transfer, our new rates will be listed in your renewal reminder letter.

If you currently pay by cash, cheque or bank transfer but would like to set up a direct debit to make your yearly subscription easier and automatic, it is really easy to do. HELLO FROM BIRMINGHAM MUSEUMS

There never seems to be a dull moment for **Birmingham Museums Trust!**





e enjoyed a busy summer programme across our many museums, welcoming 64,000 visitors over July and August, who enjoyed a diverse range of events – from the drama of Medieval Day at Weoley Castle to the musical 'Celebration of Sound' event at Thinktank in partnership with Birmingham Conservatoire.

The highs of the summer, however, were quickly overshadowed by a public statement on 5th September by our main funder and stakeholder, Birmingham City Council, announcing it had issued a section 114 notice. This means the Council is unable to balance its budget for 2024/25 and must cease all new spending, except for protecting vulnerable people, statutory services and pre-existing commitments.

Birmingham Museums Trust manages a portfolio of nine museum sites and the city's world class civic museum collection of over 1 million items on

behalf of Birmingham City Council, which currently invests 45% of our total annual funding. So, this remains deeply worrying news for the Trust as we wait to hear how Birmingham City Council will address its financial pressures, and what impact it may have on its award-winning museums service.

The heritage and culture of Birmingham is its unique DNA, a reflection of the lives and achievements of its people - past, present and future - which defines its place in the UK and the wider world. As Neil Mendoza. the chair of Historic England, said in a recent joint letter with Arts Council England and the National Lottery Heritage Fund: "Cultural and heritage assets are incredibly precious and important parts of communities. They're not things to be bought and sold."


Sadly, Birmingham Museums Trust is not alone, with many civic museums facing severe budget cuts and uncertain futures as a result of the financial

pressures on many local authorities. At times like this, the continued financial, voluntary and wider support offered by Friends of museums organisations, like the Friends of Birmingham Museums & Art Gallery, is more critical than ever before. Our Friends provide the essential core funding to lever in large grants, the time and commitment to help care for local heritage, and most importantly as I have valued in recent weeks - hope and support.

BRITISH ASSOCIATION OF FRIENDS OF MUSEUMS 50TH ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Peter Miles and I were delighted to represent the Friends at the British Association of Friends of Museums (BAFM) Annual Conference, which was held in Doncaster on Saturday 30 September 2023.

e were invited to attend to receive our certificate for 'Artefacts', which had won the BAFM Newsletter of the Year Award for 2023 and our prize was two complimentary tickets to attend the conference.

The theme of the conference was 'Regeneration: Growing the cultural offer and friends in challenging times', one which is particularly pertinent for our Friends organisation at the moment given the financial difficulties facing Birmingham City Council, and the impact this is having on Birmingham Museums Trust. In his welcoming speech, the Chief Executive Officer of the City of Doncaster underlined the vital role that creativity plays in regeneration, in building a city and in improving health and wellbeing.

Our Newsletter of the Year Award was featured in the BAFM Newsletter. The award had been relaunched this year and there were a lot of entries, so we were particularly pleased to have won! The judges felt that: 'Against a difficult time of Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery closure for refurbishment, the Friends have recognised the very real importance of the newsletter and continue to engage with their members.'

They quoted Peter's comment in his 'Chair's Observations' in the Autumn 2023 edition of 'Artefacts' that: 'now is the time when Birmingham Museums really needs its Friends more than ever.'

The judges also commented that: 'What was so impressive about Artefacts was the way it was designed to be a gateway publication for the arts and heritage within the wider area of the West Midlands. Members reading the magazine are being kept aware of exhibitions in museums in Coventry, Worcester and Kidderminster. There is information about theatre, dance and musical events as well. But the heart of the magazine is still focused on the collections of Birmingham Museums and the work of the Friends.' (BAFM Journal, Issue 131 / Autumn – Winter 2023, p.37).

'Artefacts' is produced by a small and dedicated team of volunteers and we were delighted to receive such praise about a magazine of which we are incredibly proud. I would like to thank everyone who contributes to the magazine – from writing articles to sourcing images and proofing. The passion and commitment of everyone who contributes to our publication is both remarkable and inspiring. And thank


you to you, our readers. We would not be able to do this without our Members' support and the enthusiasm with which 'Artefacts' seems to disappear off the shelves into the hands of our readers.

Following the Covid hiatus (during which 'Artefacts' was not produced) and an uncertain end to 2022, 'Artefacts' has come such a long way, making this award particularly special for us. PB&J Publishing, a small family run business set up by Paul Blyth, who has been designing 'Artefacts' for many years, and his partner Jess, took on its publication in Spring 2023, increased its circulation and have spent a huge amount of time and energy working with me to develop the magazine. We now have a 4,000 copy print run and a magazine of which we are all very proud. And congratulations to PB&J Publishing on completion of their first year of producing 'Artefacts' as this is their fourth magazine! ■

hey, of course, originate in an illustrated fable called 'A Christmas Carol', written by Charles Dickens (1812-70) in 1843. 'A Christmas Carol' has given us the character Scrooge and, such has been the impact of the story, that the term 'scrooge' is now in the 'Oxford English Dictionary'.

In 1853 Charles Dickens gave his first dramatised reading to a packed Birmingham Town Hall - and the story he read was 'A Christmas Carol'. Prior to this momentous event Dickens had a long association with Birmingham and its evolving institutions, leading to a reference to the Town in 'The Pickwick Papers' (1836-37): 'the fires, whose livid, sullen light had been visible for miles, blazed fiercely up in the great works'. Dickens' earliest visit to Birmingham in aid of good causes was on 6 June 1848, when he directed and acted in a Ben Jonson play at the Theatre Royal in New Street to raise funds in support of Shakespeare's birthplace. Dickens maintained a close relationship with the Town and its citizens and his reading of 'A Christmas Carol' was probably the highpoint.

'A Christmas Carol' was written in a short space of time, and Dickens described the writing process in 1843 to a friend as one in which he composed the story in his head, weeping and laughing as he walked 'the black streets of London, fifteen or twenty miles, many a night when all sober folks had gone to bed'. The story was motivated by Dickens' disgust at the operation of the New Poor Law and what he felt was the indifference of the wealthy to the condition of children in poverty in London. Having visited a 'ragged school' in 1843 he wrote to a friend that there was not: 'anything so shocking as the dire neglect of soul or body exhibited in these children'. No better is this illustrated than in the episode in 'A Christmas Carol' featuring the second spirit, in which Scrooge is shown a boy and a girl: 'yellow, meagre, ragged... This boy is Ignorance, this girl is Want'.

Ten years after the publication of 'A Christmas Carol', Birmingham's leading citizens were attempting to raise funds for a new organisation, the Birmingham and Midland Institute (BMI). Arthur Ryland was the main mover and he held a meeting at his house in 1852 and a public meeting to win support 'to establish a Scientific and Literary Institution'. Key to building the campaign was a letter from Dickens to Ryland offering to do a reading of 'A



Christmas Carol' in the Town Hall to help raise funds, with a condition that one of the events would be free for the working classes of the Town.

Dickens' preparations for the readings were interesting: the day started with two tablespoons of rum in cream and then a pint of champagne for tea, followed by a raw beaten egg in a tumbler of sherry just before the commencement. The readings were a complete theatrical performance with all the characters played by Dickens, hence the need for fortification! The second reading on 30 December 1853, with only a 6d entrance fee, produced a packed Town Hall and lasted three and a half hours (rather than the scheduled two hours) due to the raucous reaction of cheers, laughter and roars. Dickens writes of the event: 'The good people of Brimingham seemed to understand everything... I felt as if we were all bodily going up into the clouds together'. Dickens' visit concluded on the 31 December with a reception and gifts for his wife Catherine and eldest son Charles. There is another Birmingham connection with the Dickens family as the city's collection includes a sketch of Kate, Dickens' daughter, by the Pre-Raphaelite artist John Everett Millais. Kate modelled for Millais, as well as being an artist in her own right.

The readings were a turning point for both Dickens and Birmingham. For

Dickens, they launched his second career as a celebrity performer as well as a popular writer. For Birmingham, the BMI was established by a Parliamentary Bill in 1854, and still thrives today. The dramatised version of 'A Christmas Carol' continues to be a popular theatre production over the festive season. The Royal Shakespeare Company had a production in 2022 starring Adrian Edmondson and our own Crescent Theatre in Birmingham have a production lined up for the festive period this year. The power of Dickens' story and its social messages continues. ■



Constructed several years after the readings by Dickens. the Midland Institute & Free Library, Birmingham provided technical and scientific education for adults. It was sadly demolished in 1965, but, as we know, the Birmingham and Midland Institute (BMI) then moved to Margaret Street.

t the age of twenty she made the deliberate decision to become a painter and studied fine art at the Westminster School of Art under the painter Frederick Brown, before following him to the Slade School of Art in c.1893. She was also able to travel in Europe and her exposure to modern art in France and Spain greatly influenced her technique. Walker also attended evening painting classes with the artist, Walter Sickert. In 1912 and 1916 she returned to the Slade to study fresco and tempera painting; and then again in 1921 to study sculpture with James Havard Thomas.

This beautiful oil painting – 'A Symphony in Bronze and Silver'- was painted by Walker between 1900 and 1914, and was presented to Birmingham by the Friends in 1948. It measures 76cm high by 63.5cm wide.

In the late 19th century, the Aesthetic Movement challenged the values of mainstream Victorian culture and was a move away from politics, morals and narrative, focusing on creating art that was produced to be beautiful - 'Art for Art's sake'. In 'A Symphony in Bronze and Silver', Walker's adherence to Aestheticism's principles can be seen in her privileging of visual effects over narrative, and parallels between art and music are suggested in her use of 'Symphony' in the painting's title. Neither of the women are identified but instead the artist describes a composition of colour, using the muted pigments of her intimate interior scenes, which were more typical of her early work and usually featured female subjects. Both figures have informal poses and are apparently unaware of the viewer and that they are being captured on canvas.

Walker was a prominent figure in the art world of the time and her work was exhibited widely during her lifetime, which was particularly notable given her gender. Walker did not exhibit her work until she was 37 years old. Her painting, 'Angela', was exhibited in an exhibition at the New English Art Club in 1899, and in 1900 she was elected its first female member. Throughout the 1920s, Walker was one of the most frequently exhibited female artists in the Royal Academy's annual Summer Exhibition. She represented Britain four times at the Venice Biennale: in 1922, 1924, 1928 and 1930. She became a member of The London Group in 1936. In 1939 she represented Britain at the World Trade Fair in Chicago with her painting 'Decoration: The Excursion of Nausicaa' (1920), which is now in the collection of Tate Britain.

Tate Archives house a collection of notes on Walker's career, compiled by the painter Grace English, who met Walker in 1931. English became Walker's patron and friend. Walker regularly exhibited at the Lefevre galleries and she wrote to English about her exhibition there in 1939: 'Thank you for your beautiful letter about my show... [which] made me able to dispense so easily with the limited survey of all the obtuse press opinions and made them non-existent.... Because I am a woman I have to be patronised it seems with a sea of futilities and adjectives.' (Quoted in 'Ethel Walker' in Alicia Foster, 'Tate Women Artists', Tate Publishing, 2003). Walker's letter to English shows her exasperation at the critical response to her show, which she felt was based on her gender rather than her abilities as an artist.

The impact that her gender had on her stature as an artist during her lifetime appears to be demonstrated by the fact that Walker was not elected as an Associate Member of the Royal Academy until 1940, when she was 79 years old. Three years later, she was appointed the Dame Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (a DBE) in recognition of her contribution to British art.

In her obituary in 'The Times', Walker was described as: 'the most important woman artist of her time since Berthe Morisot'. emphasising her important status in the art world. From 7 May until 15 June 1952, the year after Walker's death, the Tate held a major retrospective entitled 'Ethel Walker, Frances Hodgkins, Gwen John', organised by Tate Director John Rothenstein, a friend of Walker's. The exhibition was well received by the critics. In 'The Spectator', one critic was impressed by the significant contribution made by each of the three artists: 'It would be ungenerous to attempt to weigh the relative importance of the three women painters... for together they form the greater part of woman's contribution to British painting in this century.' T.W. Earp, in his catalogue essay on Walker, defined Walker's particular contribution: 'although in technique her impressionism was less doctrinaire and scientific than that of the French masters - nearer to Whistler than to Monet, with less use of divided colour and for the most part content with a broad daylight effect. she gained the same result of vibrance and spontaneity. This shows particularly in her portraits of women, usually painted in one dominant key of radiant colour, which, without effort at deliberate likeness, net

the sense of personality in their rapid grasp of a moment's mood.'

In her novel 'Winter', published in 2017, Ali Smith mentions Walker commenting that: 'she was a painter of landscapes and portraits so renowned that there's practically no municipal collection in the United Kingdom that doesn't have something by her in it.'

Yet despite being well-known during her lifetime and having a prolific output, Walker's work seems to have subsequently fallen out of favour and she is now relatively unknown. Candy Bedworth, in her article 'Dame Ethel Walker - A Sensitive Portrait', states: 'How is it that an artist of such talent, with such a wealth of paintings produced, is virtually unheard of? Well, we know, don't we? It's because she was a woman. And she painted women in a gentle and sensitive way. Oh, and she was a lesbian too. All clearly rattled the fine sensibilities of the male art history club.'

In more recent years, now that the discourse of art history sanctions and encourages discussions about sexuality, Walker has been acknowledged as a lesbian artist, who explored her sexuality through her works. Walker had a preference for women sitters and female nudes and much of her work celebrates the female body and female sexuality. She preferred models to be as 'natural' as possible, removing adornments and cosmetics - all make-up, jewellery and often clothing - to allow her to focus on an individual's character and expression.

Walker's work, which can be found in many UK public collections, has become more prominent again in recent years and her large painting 'Decoration: The Excursion of Nausicaa' featured in Tate Britain's exhibition 'Queer British Art 1861 - 1967' in 2017. ■

he festival programme brilliantly illuminates avenues for cultural engagement, offering exhibitions, events and renewed opportunities for participation to UK audiences.

Coventry Biennial is held across five exhibition spaces, including the Herbert Art Gallery & Museum, the Old Grammar School, Warwick Arts Centre, Compton Verney and Coventry University's brandnew Delia Derbyshire building. The programme showcases the works of 15 diverse artists, as well as offering an array of engaging events and activities throughout the festival period.

The chosen artists cover a wide range of themes and mediums, spanning from portraiture and sculptural installations to the innovative realm of urban gardens. Midlands-based Janet Tryner, Jo Gane, Paul Lemmon, and Ania Bas are joined by international artists Dinh Q. Lê and Clémence, Lollia Hilaire, Can Altay and A History of Frogs, amongst others.

Festival visitors have the opportunity to explore Coventry's waterways, attend creative writing workshops and share their ideas on what the future of the city may look like through collaborative artpieces. Further highlights include a film screening by a Turner Prize nominated artist, guided tours on foot and by bike,

and arts-and-crafts workshops. The events programme primarily operates on a "Pay What You Can" basis. This allows for free access to tickets while also enabling audiences to contribute based on their individual capacities.

Ryan Hughes, Artistic Director and CEO of Coventry Biennial said: "It's a pleasure to have renewed, and built new local partnerships across Coventry, Warwickshire and the whole West Midlands. This is perhaps most immediately visible in relation to our exhibition venues, but it's been impactful to work with galleries and other cultural organisations across the region. We've produced amazing projects with Ikon Gallery in Birmingham, Compton Verney in Warwickshire as well as a huge range of smaller community groups across the city."

"It's also hugely significant that we continue to attract major national and international support from public funders, collections, trusts, foundations and commercial galleries. Of course, this contributes to making our work possible, but it also shines a spotlight on the whole region, its cultural institutions and the many brilliant artists that are based in the West Midlands." ■

Most of the artists take the guilt as their starting point, but many experiment with the traditional notion of guilt-making and produce distinctive. innovative and sometimes challenging work. They are united by their passion for fabric, stitch, texture and colour, and the limitless creative possibilities of the textile surface.


