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

CHAIR'S OBSERVATIONS



CHAIR'S OBSERVATIONS BY PETER MILES

I am writing this on Twelfth Night which, as we all know, celebrates the visit of the Wise Men to the Stable. They brought with them the gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

The ancient ceremony of the monarch presenting these gifts takes place on the feast of Epiphany, on 6 January, at the Chapel Royal in St James Palace in London. The service, because it is a religious service, begins with a contingent of the King's Body Guard of the Yeoman of the Guard (not to be confused with Beefeaters of the Tower of London as the uniform is similar) marching into the Chapel Royal with a large silver gilt alms dish on which are gold sovereigns, frankincense and myrrh.

The dish is presented to the Dean of the Chapel Royal (by tradition the Bishop of London) and solemnly laid on the altar. And the service begins. I have been fortunate to be invited a number of times. It is a strange experience sitting in the pews following the service from order books presented to the Chapel by George VI.

And looking around one is very conscious of the history: the Chapel where Charles I prayed on his way to his execution; the marriage of Queen Victoria to Prince Albert; and Princess Diana's body lay in the Chapel after being brought back from Paris.

Sir Edward Burne-Jones famously portraved this event in 'The Star of Bethlehem', which is in Birmingham's collection. Unfortunately this painting is just too large to be moved down to the Gas Hall for the 'Victorian Radicals' exhibition, but there will be many other gems from Birmingham's Pre-Raphaelite collection on display. The Friends are delighted to be supporting the phased reopening of Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery. And remember that Members of the Friends will have FREE entry to the 'Victorian Radical's exhibition on presentation of your valid Membership card, so do make the most of this opportunity and encourage your friends to join to receive the same benefit!

It was good to see so many Members come to Aston Hall at the beginning of December for our 'Advent event'. It seems, from the number of thanks that have been received from those Members who attended, that Kate Round talking about Cameo Glass was a great success and we will, I'm sure, be inviting her to a return match.

What was also gratifying was the level of donations we received on the day. 

This Garden Suburb has survived virtually intact for over one hundred years, and is the perfect combination of heritage, nature and community. Visitors will take a gentle stroll around the Estate, which is virtually unchanged since its completion in 1912. At the end of the tour visitors have the opportunity to have a game of skittles in the original Edwardian bowling alley! This is a predominantly outdoor excursion and Moor Pool is an undulating area. Please wear suitable footwear and clothing to suit the weather conditions and advise us of any additional needs you may have.



This major exhibition sees Birmingham's world-famous collection of Pre-Raphaelite art on display in the city for the first time in over five years. This tour will explore, in detail, a few of the 160 of Birmingham's most loved works, rarely seen all in one place at the same time.

HELLO FROM BIRMINGHAM MUSEUMS

It is my pleasure to introduce myself as the new Director of Development for Birmingham Museums Trust.

've been lucky enough to have spent my career working for some incredible organisations, most recently at National Museums Liverpool where I spent the past five years heading up their Development operation. I now have the great honour of joining the hugely talented and passionate team here at Birmingham Museums Trust.

As I've been getting to know the organisation I've been visiting the sites and getting to know the teams. A highlight has been spending some time at the Museum Collection Centre, which shows just what an extensive and fascinating collection we have here. It's an encyclopaedia of Birmingham and its people. This is one of the many reasons so many of us care deeply about museums; our collections and how we share them help us understand our history, ask questions, share memories and wonder at the extraordinary.

It has also been a challenging time to join as the Trust continue to navigate the

current situation with Birmingham City Council following the filing of a Section 114 notice and effective bankruptcy. The stretch on the Council's funds is significant however we have an agreement in place securing our funding until April 2026 as a minimum. It remains a very difficult time financially and this year our focus is to develop a new business plan that responds to our current environment, ensures a sustainable future for the Trust and furthers the great work that we do to care for and connect visitors to our collections and venues. Support from those who care deeply about the Trust will play an even more vital role in our future and we are hugely grateful for the ongoing support of you all as Friends.

There are also exciting times ahead with the phased reopening of Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery (BMAG). The rewiring work is now complete and collections are back on site which is a huge achievement. In February



we open 'Victorian Radicals: From the Pre-Raphaelites to the Arts and Craft movement' in the Gas Hall which has been curated by our incredibly knowledgeable Curator of Fine Art Victoria Osborne (read more on page 10). Welcoming home these much-loved art works is a very fitting first step in the opening of BMAG which will be followed by the opening of further galleries later in the year. Watch this space for more announcements! A sincere thank you to the Friends for your support towards BMAG, which has made a real difference in getting the building open and leveraging additional funding.

If you see me around please do come and say hello. It's always a pleasure to meet people who really care about museums and galleries and I'd love to hear some of your stories. ■

VICTORIAN RADICALS: FROM THE PRE-RAPHAELITES TO THE ARTS AND CRAFTS MOVEMENT

Birmingham's Pre-Raphaelite and Arts and Crafts collections return to the Gas Hall at Birmingham Museum & Art Gallery from 10 February 2024 in a major exhibition. Victoria Osborne, BMT's Curator of Fine Art and co-curator of 'Victorian Radicals', previews the show.

rganised by Birmingham Museums and the American Federation of Arts, and generously supported by the Friends for its Birmingham showing, 'Victorian Radicals' brings together paintings, sculpture, works on paper and decorative art from the city's collection to explore one of the most dynamic and exciting periods of British art and design. It tells the story of how three generations of artists, designers and makers working between 1840 and 1910 - the Pre-Raphaelites, William Morris and his circle, and the Arts and Crafts movement - transformed the visual arts. The exhibition integrates decorative and fine art throughout, presenting paintings and drawings alongside jewellery, glass, textiles and metalwork to draw out connections, relationships and shared ideals. It traces the influence of the Pre-Raphaelites and their circle on artists and makers into the 20th century, and explores how the 'Victorian radicals' responded to an age of rapid technological and social change with their own vision for the future, arguing for the vital place of art and creativity in society and reaffirming the value of beauty and the handmade.

The exhibition was co-curated with Martin Ellis, formerly Curator of Applied Art and head of the curatorial team at Birmingham Museums, and Professor Tim Barringer. Paul Mellon Professor of the History of Art at Yale University. It travelled to seven museums in the USA between 2018 and early 2022, reaching nearly 168,000 people in spite of the restrictions of the pandemic and winning a Global Fine Arts Award. The Gas Hall exhibition will be its only showing in the UK and features several works unique to the Birmingham exhibition. They include Alexander Munro's marble relief portrait of the young John Everett Millais, an acquisition supported by the Friends in 2020 which will be on display for the first time.

Although it tells a national story the exhibition has a distinctive Birmingham flavour, both because its content is



shaped by the strength and depth of the city's own 19th-century collections and because it highlights the importance of Birmingham itself in the Arts and Crafts movement. Its Municipal School of Art was arguably the leading centre for progressive art practice in the UK at the turn of the last century, and as early as 1887 Birmingham was described by 'The Magazine of Art' in London as 'perhaps the most artistic town in England'. Women designer-makers played a central role alongside their male peers, working across a wide range of media and exhibiting their work nationally and internationally.

When we came to select a lead image to promote 'Victorian Radicals', first for the US tour and now for the Gas Hall exhibition, we chose a work that suggests the richness and variety of the exhibition as a whole while also representing these Birmingham stories. Kate Bunce's 'Musica' depicts a young woman playing a lute in an interior densely filled with flowers and decorative objects. Bunce and her sister Myra had both studied at Birmingham School of Art in the 1880s, and the model (once thought to be an image of Myra) was probably their fellow artist A. Mary Powell. The objects in the paintingparticularly the silver repoussé mirror and necklace- recall the productions of Birmingham Arts and Crafts makers. By bringing together painting, metalwork and jewellery in a picture both by and depicting Birmingham women, the image is a celebration of the city's distinctive artistic identity while standing for the versatility and radical ideals of all the artists in this exhibition.

Alongside 'Victorian Radicals' there will be opportunities to join the conversation about how the 19th-century art and design collections will be displayed and interpreted in the future, as we consult with visitors and the wider public ahead of the phased reopening of the permanent galleries at Birmingham Museum & Art Gallery. We will be sharing some of the work BMT has been co-leading since 2020 to explore the global histories and contexts of its 19th-century art and design collections through the British Art Network research group Race, Empire & the Pre-Raphaelites, with a view to telling more of the complex and nuanced stories of these historical objects in our displays. An area of the Gas Hall will highlight five pieces from the collection, suggesting some ways of thinking about them that open up fresh perspectives, and there will also be special events as part of the exhibition's public programme to prompt further conversation. We hope Friends will join us to help shape future displays of these important collections, and meanwhile are looking forward to welcoming you back to the Gas Hall for the Pre-Raphaelites' return. ■



Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery opened in 1885, two years before Stanford arrived in Birmingham. With his belief in education and self-improvement it seems likely that he may have visited as it was within walking distance of the Baptist Chapel in Hope Street.

CHANGING BIRMINGHAM ~ ITS PEOPLE AND PLACES

HOPE IN HIGHGATE

As we can see from 'Birmingham from Highgate Fields' by Henry Burn (below), in the 1830s Highgate was a rural area. Now it is probably best known for its skyline of Birmingham Central Mosque and the earlier building of St Alban's.

s the nineteenth century progressed, Highgate became densely populated, with back to backs and small workshops becoming the dominant features. It is this period which we are going to examine during which time Highgate was the neighbourhood in which two important firsts took place.



On 18th May 1889, the Baptist Chapel in Hope Street wrote to a Reverend Peter Stanford (left): 'it was unanimously decided that we, the members and congregation

attending the above place of worship, invite you to become our pastor.' The significance of this letter was that this working-class community was inviting Birmingham's first African American Preacher, who had been born into slavery, to be their spiritual leader. Stanford had arrived in Birmingham in 1887 and was welcomed into a Baptist Chapel in Small Heath by the Reverend Charles Joseph, who became Stanford's firm friend and supporter. He married a local woman from Smethwick and became a major part of the non-conformist circuit. But what attracted Stanford to Birmingham? Gail Richards, writing in a recent article about Stanford, feels that: 'Birmingham as a city had a worldwide reputation for justice, equality and enterprise, had been at the forefront of the campaign against slavery." Birmingham was no stranger to African Americans with Stanford's hero, Frederick Douglas, having visited the city in 1846 and debated with Joseph Sturge on how to abolish slavery in the United States.

One campaigner who came to Birmingham whilst Stanford was at Hope Street was Ida B Wells. She was campaigning against lynching in the Southern USA states, speaking in Birmingham on 17th May 1894 at the Young Men's Christian Association and Methodist Central Hall, and staying at 66 Gough Street, Edgbaston. A few days later on the 21st May there was a public meeting addressed by Stanford at the



Wilberforce Memorial Church on the topic of 'Lynch law and the Negro'. The result was a successful petition to financially support Stanford to visit the USA, enabling him to investigate and campaign on the issue. The petition was signed by many well-known Birmingham individuals including Samuel Lloyd, Richard Cadbury and J.A. Langford, plus many Councillors and church leaders. In 1895 Stanford, with his wife and daughter Carrie, travelled to the USA and he became a Pastor in Boston. We are indebted to the Reverend Paul Walker at Highgate Baptist Church (previously Hope Street Chapel) whose research has brought this story to contemporary understanding, with Stanford commemorated by a blue plaque at the church.

Whilst a pastor at Hope Street Chapel, Stanford would have been able to walk up the hill from Sherlock Street to enjoy the newly opened Highgate Park. This was Birmingham's first truly municipal park, initiated solely by Birmingham Corporation, purchased at a cost of £8,100, and laid out for a further £4,500. Originally charity land, it had become increasingly a place for dumped rubbish and illegal gambling and so from the 1850s there had been a campaign for it to become a park. Part of the Joseph Chamberlain municipal revolution.

Chamberlain opened Highgate Park on 2nd June 1876, making the case for public parks: 'to keep alive in hearts and minds of the people some sense of beauty - then the provision of trees with green foliage, of shrubs... was as necessary to their elevation as schools, and libraries and galleries of art'. That elevation in Highgate Park consisted of a children's playground in the area at the base of the sloping park, with a terrace connecting to an upper area of green open space with plenty of trees and shrubs, complete with a piped watering system. All the work was overseen by the Baths and Parks Committee and Mr Rodway, the Parks Superintendent, and their diligence lives on in the current park in the heart of the city.

MYRA LOUISE BUNCE 'SKETCHES OF NORTH WALES AND BOURNEMOUTH', 1875-77

In 2001, the Friends purchased the Sketchbook of Myra Bunce's watercolour and pencil sketches of North Wales and Bournemouth from 1875-1877.

or the Spring 2024 edition of 'Artefacts' I have chosen to look at Myra Louisa Bunce's (1854-1919) 'Sketches of North Wales and Bournemouth', 1875-77 as she was an English designer and painter associated with the Arts and Crafts movement and the Pre-Raphaelites, and we will be celebrating Birmingham's Pre-Raphaelite collections over the next few months with the opening of 'Victorian Radicals' in the Gas Hall from 10 February 2024.

Myra Bunce was born in Birmingham, one of four daughters of Rebecca Ann (d.1891) and John Thackray Bunce (1828-1899). The Bunce family was one of Birmingham's most prominent artistic families of the late Victorian/Edwardian period. John Bunce was editor of the 'Birmingham Daily Post' for nearly forty years and was closely associated with the new municipal Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery as well as being a Board member of the Birmingham Municipal School of Art. He was given 'Freedom of the City' on 7th March 1899 for his services to art. John Bunce had a progressive outlook, and spoke in favour of allowing women an arts education equivalent to their male counterparts. Birmingham School of Art's Headmaster, E.R. Taylor, welcomed female artists and Myra and her elder sister Kate Bunce (1856-1927) were two of the first women to study there in the 1880s. Elsewhere, female artists were prevented from accessing life drawing classes but the Bunce sisters attended these classes at the School of Art, as can be seen in a photo entitled: 'The Life Class, Birmingham School of Art', which includes both sisters and is in Birmingham's collection. This photo is reproduced in the 'Victorian Radicals' feature on page 10 and Myra is seated in the second row, second from the left with glasses; and Kate is also seated in the second row, second from the right.

It has been argued that preventing female artists from having access to such classes was intended to stop them from producing works within the highly esteemed genres of historical and allegorical paintings, which included naked bodies.

John Bunce's support of female artists assisted both his daughters in achieving a comprehensive artistic education. Birmingham's School of Art's progressive approach to art education meant that the sisters studied a wide variety of disciplines including embroidery and





metalwork alongside drawing and painting, with the decorative arts being taught on an equal footing to the traditional 'fine' arts.

Myra's watercolour and pencil sketches of North Wales and Bournemouth, dating from 1875-77 and purchased by the Friends for Birmingham in 2001, demonstrate her skills using watercolour. She captures the light and details with her brushstrokes. On one of the pages, she has written: 'M L Bunce Bristol Road Birmingham. 1875. If anyone finds this book please return it to the above address'. Myra's skills as a watercolourist are also shown in her depiction of a completely different subject in 'Untitled (The Sitting Room)', a watercolour on card dating from 1887, which is also in Birmingham's collection. In this painting a woman is seated on a chair in a wealthy environment – a sitting room which opens on to a conservatory. Myra depicts and celebrates handmade arts and crafts, from stained glass and ceramics to patterned rugs and demonstrates her talent at painting a variety of different materials.

Whilst also making jewellery, Myra was particularly renowned for her metalwork. She designed frames for some of her sister's paintings, including the frame which holds 'The Keepsake' (1901), which is also in Birmingham's collection. The material requirements of Myra's metalwork made it necessary for her to have a dedicated workspace within her home. This disturbed the conventional expectation of the time - that females produced their artwork, which was limited to embroidery, drawings, small watercolours, or similar - in a discreet domestic parlour setting within the living spaces of the home, not in a separate space such as a home workshop. The sisters' home was both a private as well as a professional space.

The sisters were both devout High-Church Anglicans and they worked collaboratively on decorative murals, altarpieces and reredos for churches, including St Alban the Martyr in Birmingham. Birmingham's collection includes three works by Myra's sister, Kate.

Myra's work exemplifies the spirit of The Arts and Crafts movement. They rejected mass-production, advocating a return to the handmade and to individual craftsmanship in the decorative and 'useful' arts.

Myra Bunce made a valuable contribution to the Arts and Crafts movement. Her specialism in metalwork exemplified the pioneering approach of Birmingham School of Art. Supported by her family, she was able to challenge the gender stereotypes of the time, being educated in and engaging in artistic pursuits which were previously seen to be exclusively for men, helping to break boundaries and forge the way for subsequent female artists.



DRAWING ON THE RBSA COLLECTION: DRY MEDIA WORKS 1822–2022

Selected from the Royal Birmingham Society of Artists (RBSA) Collection, this exhibition offers a broad cross section of works on paper by Members and Associates of the RBSA from the Victorian period to the present. The show concentrates on dry media: drawing materials that are not based on water or oil.

rawing with dry media is as old as mankind. Ochre and charcoal dust were blown through straws onto cave walls by the first artists. In more recent times, the dry media of pencil, pastel and willow charcoal were favoured by travelling artists as ideal for drawing with minimum of fuss onsite, in sketchbooks or portfolios. They were the basic means through which European artists recorded, prepared, studied and imagined, often as a prelude to painting or engraving. Dry media was central to professional art training but also accessible to amateurs. For many of us, the pencils and crayons of childhood were our first contact with the creative process and the world of art.

Fine drawings are valued not just for their subtle qualities but also for the insights they offer into the artist's imagination. Works shown here cover the whole range of expression from the delicately drawn 'Dovecote' in pastel by James Valentine Jelley (1856 - 1950) to the bold and strident 'Hippopotamus Amphibius' by David Walton (b.1943) in graphite and charcoal. The humble pencil has been used in the UK from the late 16th century when pure graphite deposits were discovered in Cumbria, corresponding with the establishment of paper mills in England able to supply the increasing demand from artists for affordable, standardised papers. The informal pencil portraits made by Edward Samuel Harper (1854 - 1941) of his fellow RBSA Members made during Society meetings are, in many cases, the only surviving likeness we have of the men who dominated the Birmingham art scene in the late Victorian and Edwardian period. They are one of the treasures of the RBSA Collection.

Other fine examples of pencil drawing are represented by the exquisite landscapes of the Lines family who, in Victorian Birmingham, developed a trademark style of lively, accurate, observational drawing. Some of them reveal a new and intense curiosity about the appearance of the natural world, made more so by encroaching industrialisation as the artists watched the relentless expansion of their town into the surrounding countryside. Another aspect of industrial progress is seen in 'Dead Locomotive' by Laurence Hammonds (1930 – 94), the carcass of the old engine left to rust amongst the weeds and tall grasses. The artist loved trains and was a founder member, with Terence Cuneo, of the Guild of Railway Artists. This expressive conté drawing is his lament for the passing of the age of steam.

Pastels made of coloured pigment bound with gum give the artist the whole range of colours available to the watercolourist and oil painter. Two contrasting examples here are the 'Wild Beauty of Clee' by Claire Spencer (b.1937) and the radiant 'Vitalism 2' by Janette Summerfield (b.1963). The view of 'The Old Portico of the RBSA on New Street' by Joseph Southall (1861 - 1944) captures the appearance of the Corinthian edifice prior to demolition in 1913. He skilfully combines pencil, charcoal and pastel on tinted paper, demonstrating how well dry media can work together. The suffuse quality and texture of pastel often lends itself to poetic and romantic subjects, for example 'Melrose Abbey, South Transept' by Herbert Alcott (1880 - 1951). Alcott captures something of the melancholy quality of the gothic abbey, once the burial place of Scottish kings and the embalmed heart of Robert the Bruce, now a ruin standing open to the sky. There is a touch of magic in the pastel 'Winter at the Chase' by Linda Neville (b.1952), an atmospheric view of Cannock Chase which local folklore says is the haunt of elves and sprites. J.R.R. Tolkien was stationed there in 1915 and began to conceive the idea of Middle-Earth. It's a special place that has inspired generations of artists.

The exhibition also includes a fine crayon drawing, 'A Newlyn Woman' by William Arthur Breakspeare (1855 – 1914), one of the group of 'Birmingham Boys' led by Walter Langley, who migrated to Newlyn in the 1880s. For them, it was a last outpost of the pre-industrial age and they set out to record, as honestly as possible, the daily life of the local fisher folk. In a bold, strongly outlined drawing, the artist not only captures the details of the woman's costume but a sense of the vitality of the figure in motion. ■





Explore the story of Worcestershire through amazing objects and exhibitions in the Worcestershire County Museum and relax in the picturesque grounds and gardens.

Hartlebury Castle's history is full of unique stories; two of Worcester's Bishops were burnt at the stake, Queen Elizabeth I dined in the Great Hall and a butler went on to star in Doctor Who. Behind the doors of the Bishop's Palace talking portraits and a charming audio guide take you on a journey around grand State rooms, a beautiful chapel, and the unique Hurd library. Built in 1782 by Richard Hurd, Bishop of Worcester the Library is the only example of an Anglican bishop's library remaining on its original shelves in the room built for it.

Hartlebury Castle is home to the Worcestershire County Museum where you can explore the history of Worcestershire through fascinating museum collections including costume, archaeology and agriculture. Step back to Victorian times in the schoolroom and scullery, take a tour of the 1950s in the Lavish Living exhibition and enjoy three centuries of fashion in the Captivating Costume gallery - from the extravagant frocks of the Georgians to the miniskirts of the 1960s.

A relaxing walk around the peaceful grounds of Hartlebury Castle reveals the historic moat, the flora's colours of the seasons and a 280-year-old mulberry tree. Hayley's Kitchen café serves delicious meals, cakes and hot drinks. There's also plenty of space to picnic in the grounds.

Hartlebury Castle is situated just off the A449 between Worcester and Kidderminster with free parking on site. It is open from 1 February to 22 December, Tuesday to Friday 10am-5pm, Saturday, Sunday and Bank Holidays 11am - 5pm. Tatiana Wolska: 'Leisure as Resistance'

9 March – 2 June 2024. First Floor Gallery, free entry. 'Leisure as Resistance' marks Tatiana Wolska's first institutional solo exhibition in the UK. Born in 1977, Wolska utilises recycled materials, invoking the resourcefulness ingrained in her during her childhood in communist Poland, where recycling became a necessity due to the scarcity of goods.

The exhibition will showcase some of her signature recycled plastic bottle sculptures and several new commissions, including reclaimed wood pallet sculptures, large-scale drawings, monumental makeshift hut made using scrap wood and a mural a site-specific wall drawing. One of Wolska's plastic bottles sculptures will be on display in MAC's Outdoor Terrace.

Wolska, describing herself as a 'junk collector', breathes new life into discarded plastic bottles, salvaged timber, rusty nails and foam from old mattresses. She transforms these oncepolluting materials into captivating sculptures. Wolska's drawings mirror her sculptures, crafted with ink, pen, pencil, and paint, revealing enigmatic forms with ribbed surfaces and folds.

Wolska has designed the space with a strong emphasis on facilitating and promoting meetings, workshops and discussions centred around critical topics such as the regeneration of natural resources, climate crisis or the concept of resistance through leisure. Audiences will be invited to activate this space through community activities such as reading groups, knitting clubs, clothes swaps, repair cafés, and meditation-through-drawing sessions. MAC's further programming for the exhibition, including related community outreach events, will be announced at a later date. 'Leisure as Resistance' is curated by Roma Piotrowska.

'New Narratives in Photography'

3 February – 6 May 2024. Community Gallery. Opening February 2024, 'New Narratives in Photography' presents a body of work by four photography artists, using their medium in new and innovative ways to comment on our lives today. The exhibition explores the prevalent themes of social justice, identity, gender, diaspora and home.

The exhibition is the culmination of an international collaboration to support diverse, marginalised and emerging Pakistani artists by GRAIN Projects (Birmingham, UK) and Tasweerghar (Lahore, Pakistan). Each artist presents work created during their individual residency projects (2023 – 2024), offering a unique and personal approach to their craft.

'New Narratives in Photography' is curated by Roma Piotrowska as part of the British Council Pakistan Arts Residency Grants Programme. Featured artists: Asad Ali, Hira Noor, Ume Laila and Waleed Zafar.

With both contemporary and traditional techniques and approaches on display, including screen printing, linocut, monoprint, etching, woodcut, lithography, and dry point, the exhibition is a wonderfully diverse show championing a medium that is often overshadowed by others.

Contemporary Pâte de Verre: The material of Time

27th January – 23rd June 2024. A unique exhibition of internationally acclaimed Pâte de Verre glass artists from several countries and continents. The exhibition is based on the comprehensive book "Pâte de Verre: The Material of Time" (2022) by Dr Max Stewart and Tone Ørvik. Including the work of Emma Varga (Australia), Alicia Lomné (US), Keith Cummings (UK) and other pioneers of contemporary Pâte de Verre.

For this exhibition Stourbridge Glass Museum is cooperating with the Contemporary Pâte de Verre Association. CPdVA works to support new investigations into Pâte de Verre and what this glass technique can do in sculpture and new narratives for our rapidly changing world. CPdVA was started by Stewart and Ørvik with US-based glass artists Evelyn Gottschall Baker and Tali Grinshpan, and offers conferences, workshops, and exhibitions worldwide.

DAME LAURA KNIGHT: "I PAINT TODAY"

'Dame Laura Knight – I Paint Today' is on display at Worcester City Art Gallery & Museum from Saturday 13 January – Sunday 30 June 2024

urated by Worcester City Art Gallery & Museum, 'Dame Laura Knight - I Paint Today' pays homage to this significant artist who was the first female artist welcomed into the Royal Academy and whose love of Worcestershire and the Malvern Hills inspired her art throughout the later years of her life.

'I Paint Today' brings a stirring selection of Knight's work to Worcestershire and focuses on key events, characters and achievements which helped to shape her life and career. Works from the Worcester City collection are displayed alongside loans from regional and national museums including the Imperial War Museum, London Transport Museum and Wolverhampton Art Gallery, to help tell the story of a woman who grew out of the Victorian era and developed and adapted her craft through a period of tumultuous change.

From 1933 Laura Knight and her husband, Harold were frequent visitors to Malvern and fell in love with the dramatic landscape of the Malvern Hills which became a subject of her much-loved paintings. Laura Knight claimed she did her best landscapes in Malvern and her paintings of this period demonstrate her love of the countryside in all seasons. She would start her day with a walk over the Malvern Hills, using make-shift studios around the hills to create from, and then meet fellow artists to 'take the water'. Through the 1920s and 1930s Knight was known for painting theatrical scenes, keen to show all aspects of performance. 'The Yellow Dress', a much-loved artwork in the Worcester City collection and featured in the exhibition, shows the costume-making studio at the Royal Shakespeare Company, capturing colour and artistry with thick brushstrokes.

At the outbreak of World War Two, Laura Knight enlisted with the War Artists Advisory Committee. From the slopes of the Malvern Hills, she watched the bombings of Coventry and Birmingham. Laura painted many iconic images of the war including a pictorial record of the Nuremburg trials.

Despite moving back to London after Harold's death, familiar echoes of the Malvern landscape that Dame Laura Knight loved so much can be detected in her paintings right up until the end of her life.

Deborah Fox, Museums Worcestershire Senior Curator commented: "Worcester City Art Gallery & Museum is committed to bringing great art and artists to the region. We are very excited to celebrate the extraordinary life and prolific work of Dame Laura Knight and are particularly pleased to revisit her connection with our beautiful county."

The exhibition is accompanied by a programme of talks and tours including

an introduction to the life and work of Dame Laura Knight and the 'I Paint Today' exhibition on Tuesday 12 March, 2pm and a bite size talk on Dame Laura Knight's links to Worcestershire with author Heather Whatley on Tuesday 11 June, 2pm. Booking via www.museumsworcestershire.org.uk


